that the greater the students' religiosity, the more their social work values conflict with their religious/spiritual values. Students in the high religiosity category experienced greater conflict on the average than students in the low religiosity group.

Likewise, Christian right leaders championed a particular vision of masculinity in their campaigns against gay rights and nuclear disarmament. Movements like the Promise Keepers called men to take responsibility for leading their families. Christian right political campaigns and pro-family organizations drew on conservative evangelical beliefs about men, women, children, and authority. These beliefs—known collectively as family values—became the most important religious agenda in late twentieth-century American politics.
